




Ready Player One by Ernest Cline


Divergent by Veronica Roth

A novel that will leave you breathless.





Then Todd Hewitt unexpectedly stumbles on a spot of complete silence. Which is impossible. And now he's going to have to run...




Delirium by Lauren Oliver

But now love has been declared a dangerous disease.



Cinder is caught between duty and freedom, loyalty and betrayal. Now she must uncover secrets about her mysterious past in order to protect Earth's future.




The City in the Middle of the Night by Charlie Jane Anders



December is the time of the annual Ceremony at which each twelve-year-old receives a life assignment determined by the Elders.




With his life and the freedom of everyone in the TDE on the line, Caine's success will depend on whether or not he can find them. . .
