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Dear Parent/Carers,

Happy New Year! I hope you and your families had a restful and enjoyable break over the festive period. As we welcome 2025, I want to thank you for your continued support and understanding as we begin the new term, particularly in light of the very challenging weather conditions we have faced this week.



As you are aware, the heavy snowfall, followed by sub-zero temperatures across the region, have created significant difficulties, with temperatures dropping as low as -II°C and widespread black ice affecting side roads, pavements, and school sites. Monday's full closure and the delayed starts for the rest of the week were not decisions which were taken lightly but, as always in these circumstances, were made in the interests of the health and safety of the IGS school community.



In making these decisions, we carefully assess a range of factors. The safety of travel routes for both students and staff is a primary concern. This includes not only the condition of side roads but also the traffic congestion on main roads as people avoid more hazardous routes, as well as the state of the pavements, many of which were untreated and dangerously icy. A delayed start provides students who walk to school with extra time to take necessary precautions and travel in daylight, while also allowing families driving to school additional time to do so safely. Additionally, it makes allowances for the disruptions to public transport services during severe weather conditions where buses and trains have been delayed or, in some cases, cancelled.

On-site safety is also a critical consideration. Our site is complex, built on a hillside, with a 29-metre elevation difference between the top and bottom of the site, and includes multiple buildings that require students to transition outdoors throughout the day. Given these challenges, the site team require ample time each morning to grit and re-grit pathways and the stairs. The persistently low temperatures caused any melted ice and snow from gritting to refreeze rapidly, creating hazardous conditions. Thanks to the team's diligent and ongoing efforts to reapply grit, these risks were mitigated, ensuring the site remained as safe as possible for everyone once we were open.

Staffing levels also play an essential role in our decision-making. Many members of staff travel longer distances to school, often along untreated or secondary roads before they can access main roads, and they require additional time to navigate these conditions safely. Furthermore, with numerous primary schools and nurseries needing to close, delay opening, or cancel breakfast clubs, many IGS staff members with childcare responsibilities have needed additional time to make alternative childcare arrangements before travelling to school.



Despite these challenges, I am proud that we were able to open on four out of the five days this week, albeit with a later start. Indeed, I would like to take the opportunity to thank our Site Team, led by Site Manager Mark Clough, for their Herculean efforts this week. They worked additional hours on Sunday, the whole of Monday, and came in early each morning this week to ensure the school could open safely. Their commitment and hard work behind the scenes have been essential in enabling us to provide some continuity of education despite the challenges we have faced.

I would also like to commend our students for their excellent response to this unusual start to the term. Their sensible behaviour, resilience, and positive

attitude throughout this difficult period have been incredibly impressive. Even in the face of disruption, they have shown a strong commitment to their learning and have continued to remind us how amazing they are!

As we move forward, we are determined to ensure that the remainder of this term is as productive and successful as possible. There is certainly a lot to look forward to with highlights this half-term including:

- 23rd January Post-16 Taster Day for students in year 11
- 23rd January Red Kite Battle of the Bands
- 10th-13th February School production of Les Misérables

We are also looking forward to the publication of our Ofsted report following the inspection in December and we expect that this will be available later this month.

Here's very much hoping we are back to normality on Monday!

P-16 Presentation Evening: 17 December 2024



Ilkley Grammar School celebrates the exceptional Class of 2024 with gala Presentation Evening at the King's Hall

It was with great pride that Ilkley Grammar School welcomed back the exceptional Year 13 'Class of 2024' for an evening at the King's Hall in Ilkley to celebrate their outstanding A level, BTEC and wider successes.

The excited buzz of results day last summer was repeated at the King's Hall the week before Christmas as IGS staff, students and their families gathered one last time, in person, to reflect on what had been achieved by the year group. The evening began with a beautiful performance on piano of Debussy's First Arabesque by current Year 13 student Genna Pickett and Headteacher, Carly Purnell, continued the evening by welcoming back former students (many having just finished their first term at university) and their parents/carers.

Mrs Purnell went on to celebrate the fact that as a year group they had achieved a fantastic set of A-Level and BTEC results, with 35% of all grades at the highest level of A/A*, almost 2 in every 3 grades A*-B, 85% at grades A*-C and a pass rate of over 99% with



IGS ranking, once again, as one of the highest performing comprehensive 6th Forms in the north of England and, according to the Sunday Times Parent Power Guide 2025, as the top comprehensive school across Bradford, Leeds and North Yorkshire.

Mrs Purnell spoke of how, as well as celebrating the academic achievements of the year group, she also wanted to shine a light on the values, character and contributions that make a school truly exceptional and of how a successful school is the sum of its people, their actions, their compassion and the positive impact they have on one another. She spoke of how, together, the year group have created a legacy of which they can be truly proud. Students then collected their A-level and BTEC certificates to the warm applause and congratulations of friends, family, IGS staff and special guests including the Guest of Honour, Ruth Pitt, the Deputy Mayor of Ilkley, Jane Gibson, Sean Crannigan, presenting the Elizabeth Crannigan Arts Award, Samantha Hill, President of the Ilkley Playhouse and Peter Shelley, Chair of Governors.

Many superb individual achievements were recognised in the 34 subject awards, as well as through nearly 70 additional prizes for outstanding individual progress and attainment across the curriculum. This year in total nine students had achieved three or more grades at A*/Dist* in every one of their full A Level/Level 3 courses and a further 35 students had achieved straight As or above with a record 12 students taking up places at Oxbridge last term, as well as many other individual successes – every student with their own, unique story to tell.

Students have gone on to progress to over 50 different universities onto courses ranging from Accountancy to Wildlife Conservation and as diverse as Celtic and Anglo Saxon Studies; Naval Architecture & Marine Engineering, Live Sound Engineering & Music Production; Fashion Design & Marketing; Midwifery; Interior Architecture & Design; and everything else in between! Other highly prized destinations in 2024 have included Degree Level Apprenticeships with companies such as Blackrock London, Jet2 and Mazars as well as employment with local company Pendle Sports and it was very special to hear students talking excitedly about their first few months at university, on Gap Years, in apprenticeships or work.

In his speech Mr Fox, Assistant Headteacher (Post-16) welcomed back this very special year group and spoke of what a privilege it had been to work with them and to see them grow into young adults, of their many and diverse talents – of students who were *quietly inspirational*, of *breathtaking* drama performances, and of how much he will miss them. He went on to thank all the members of the post-16 team and teachers at the school.

The school was delighted to welcome Ruth Pitt, an award-winning journalist, broadcaster and chair of the organisation working to deliver the National Poetry Centre in Leeds in partnership with the Poet Laureate Simon Armitage, as the guest of honour. In her speech she drew upon her extensive experience of working in the Creative Industries and spoke about the importance of stories, of how young people are 'stories waiting to be written' and of how, whether as a participant or a consumer, creativity is not only profoundly good for the heart and the soul but also for the country with the creative industries currently growing twice as fast as the rest of the UK economy. She finished by encouraging the guests to 'Tell YOUR story, YOUR way' and to remember that it is culture and the arts that makes life worth living.

Special awards recognising wider achievements beyond academic success and celebrating each of the school values of Responsibility, Respect, Kindness, Resilience, Courage and Pride and contributions in the Creative Arts, Design Technology, Sport and outstanding student leadership were also celebrated.

Guests were treated to further excellent musical performances from current and former students including performances of Santa Fe from Newsies the musical by Head Student Justin Derla, It's Beginning To Look a Lot Like Christmas by Matthew Disney and Dylan Hurst, and a finale from Charlotte Dear who delivered a superb rendition of Mozart's Ridente La Calma, accompanied by Mrs Chapman on the piano.

Jamie Gutch, Deputy Headteacher, who compered the evening said "Presentation Evening represents the end of one journey but the beginning of many new ones with students on the threshold of the next stage of their lives. It was a privilege to be able to welcome students and parents/carers to the King's Hall to celebrate their many and diverse achievements. I would like to publicly thank all those who taught this cohort as they made their way up the school and while in the 6th Form. Special thanks must also go to Mr Fox (Assistant Headteacher for Post-16), Mr Sykes (Associate Assistant Headteacher i/c year 13), Mrs Pickard (i/c year 12), Mr Boyd (Senior Tutor, year 12), Mrs Boyd (Senior Tutor, year 13), Mrs Walsh (Head of Post-16 Pastoral), Mrs Simkiss (Student Achievement Manager), the dedicated team of form tutors and all those who tirelessly provided both academic and pastoral support to these students over their time in Post-16."

Mr Gutch continued "This event is one of the highlights of our annual calendar and we were delighted that so many of our former students and parents/carers were able to join us for the evening and to celebrate with us. Well done the class of 2024! Your school and your families are very proud of you, and we wish you all the very best for the future!"
