Dear Parents/Carers,

Sharing our glowing Ofsted report with students, staff, parents, and the wider community two weeks ago was a truly proud moment. Since its official publication on the Ofsted website, I have been continually reminded of how remarkable our students are. Their achievements, which fill me with immense pride, shine through in so many ways and have included the following areas:

#### Outstanding Sporting Achievements – from teamwork to individual success

On Saturday I<sup>st</sup> February, I watched our year 8 and 9 rugby teams play in the finals of the Yorkshire Cup and Yorkshire Plate at West Park, Leeds. Both finals were competitive and the IGS teams fought hard right through to the final whistle, showing real resilience, character and representing the school with pride. Whilst they were beaten on the day by strong opposition, getting to the final and coming second in Yorkshire in their respective competitions is a fantastic achievement and a result of a high level of skill, teamwork, practice and preparation.

The rugby was followed by an afternoon at GSAL, watching 29 of our students race in the West Yorkshire Schools' Cross Country where they represented the Bradford district, racing against competitors from Leeds, Kirklees, Wakefield and Calderdale. There were some brilliant individual achievements which are detailed in the sports section of the bulletin including Max Brett who came first in the year 7 boys' race and Archie Budding who secured victory in the boys' senior category where IGS dominated, placing first, second, third and fourth! While we await final confirmation of the students who will advance to the national finals, IGS will be well represented with at least 10 students expected to have qualified for the national stage. Well done to all of our runners for representing their school and district so positively!

There have also been fantastic results in football at local, regional and national level – where our year 7 boys' B team are through to the quarter-final of the English Schools' competition – as well as in netball with convincing victories for our year 11 and 9 A teams.

#### **Creative Excellence**

Being amongst the 450 strong audience at The Wardrobe in Leeds to enjoy the Red Kite Battle of the Bands competition, organised by IGS staff Jess Pymar and Nick Peters, has been another recent highlight. The event provided a fantastic opportunity for bands across alliance schools to perform live at a professional venue and be judged by industry experts who included Simon Rix of the Kaiser Chiefs, as well as enabling IGS students to run the show and perform key roles behind the scenes. We were treated to a fabulous display of young musical talent, including the IGS band, Duktape, who gave a memorable performance of their own song "Brain Drain."

I have also been privileged to watch some of the rehearsals for Les Misérables and have been blown away by students' performances as they rehearse for next week's shows. The talent on display is truly breathtaking! I have also been incredibly impressed by the hard work that has gone into creating the set, costumes, and all of the technical elements. I don't want to give anything away, but if you've secured tickets, you're in for a spectacular evening!

#### High aspirations and ambition:

As many of our year 13 students are receiving offers from universities, conservatoires and for apprenticeships across the country, 9 students have been offered places at Oxford or Cambridge this year to read Natural Sciences, Mathematics, Engineering, Law, and Languages. Applying to Oxbridge is always an extremely rigorous and character-testing experience and all students who put themselves forward for this process have demonstrated ambition, resilience and courage regardless of the final outcome.

This is always an exciting time of year as students start to see their offers coming through, reflecting years of hard work and commitment. Whether heading to university, conservatoires, or securing apprenticeship or employment opportunities, we are incredibly proud of all our students as they aim high and take these important next steps. For more examples of the diverse destinations our Year 13s are considering, please see the feature in this week's bulletin as the offers continue to roll in.

In all the examples above, the success is not only a reflection of the talent and commitment of our students but also the hard work and commitment of staff who give up their evenings and, at times, weekends to provide amazing opportunities for our students and support them to achieve their Personal Best. I would again like to reiterate my thanks to colleagues, as well as recognising the importance of parents/carers for your support and encouragement of your children.












# **MUSIC NEWS!**

# 55 Oxbridge offers in 5 years - Ilkley Grammar School again celebrates Post-16 destinations success

The Class of 2025 secures 9 Oxbridge offers as many students receive offers to study on an exciting range of courses at university and pursue competitive apprenticeships across the country...

As we approach the end of January, Ilkley Grammar School is starting to see a more detailed picture of 2025 student destinations as university and apprenticeship offers come through. Most students have yet to make their final choices but offers have been coming in from universities across the country to study on courses from Ancient History to 3D Animation and as diverse as Cognitive Neuroscience and American Studies; Cyber Investigations with Digital Forensics; Data Science; Environmental Science; Forensic Psychology; Illustration; International Relations; Italian & Spanish; Marine and Freshwater Biology; Mathematics with a Year Abroad; Mental Health Nursing; Midwifery; Molecular Cell Biology; Musical Theatre; Optometry; Pharmacology; Philosophy; Psychology with Neuropsychology; Rehabilitation and Exercise Science; Real Estate; Social Work; Public Health; Theology; Theoretical Physics; Zoology and many more. The destinations range from Aberystwyth to Aberdeen and from Ulster to Dundee and beyond.



Some students have also set their sights further afield, for example Archie Budding (pictured left) has recently been offered an athletics scholarship (for cross country and track and field) to study at Grand Canyon University in Arizona while studying economics and finance. Closer to home, Jessie Duckworth (pictured right) is the first IGS student ever to have secured a place on a highly competitive course with Norland College, one of the most prestigious childcare providers in the world.

Mr Gutch, Deputy Headteacher says 'the uncertainty of the application phase has changed to a sense of excitement as students have started to receive offers from their chosen destinations. Some find it hard to believe that



the academic work and wider personal development experiences that they write about in their applications really do translate into life-changing offers and opportunities. Mirroring a national trend, an increasingly large cohort of students is making the decision to apply for Degree Level Apprenticeships which, with highly competitive interview processes and challenging entry requirements, open up hugely valuable pathways for students.'



Although the application window for apprenticeships remains open until after results day in August, and students haven't typically received offers for Degree-level Apprenticeships yet, many IGS students are currently pursuing this route, for example with the BBC. IGS

also recently had a visit from Proctor & Gamble who showcased their apprenticeship pathways.

In the Creative Arts several students have made applications to Conservatoires, with Emma Chapman (pictured left) receiving an offer from the Leeds Conservatoire and a reserve offer from the Royal Northern College of Music.

With Bradford celebrating its position as the national city of culture in 2025, students are also celebrating creative industry offers. These

include: Alisha Pitts to study Architectural Design at Salford; Nancy Gale (pictured right) Fashion Design & Technology at Manchester Metropolitan; Lucija Coelho Fashion Design at Leeds Arts or Nottingham Trent, and Henry Cesar De Sa (pictured right) has received an offer from Loughborough University to study Construction Management with a placement year in industry.















#### Continued Oxbridge success with over 55 offers in 5 years

With nine students receiving offers to Oxford or Cambridge in recent weeks, IGS can celebrate sustained success over the last 5 years, during which period, over 55 students have received offers from Oxbridge.

Mr Sykes, Associate Assistant Headteacher says, "It is always a privilege to work closely with students supporting them with their applications. This is where all the hard work comes together, bringing them within touching distance of their chosen destinations. It is also wonderful to work alongside such experienced and dedicated staff at IGS as well as with members of the wider llkley community who provide opportunities beyond those which the school alone can offer. I would like to say a huge thank you to these people for their time and efforts for our students."



With a requirement to submit an early application, highly specialised subject-specific interviews, and a range of additional aptitude tests, individual Oxbridge preparation at Ilkley Grammar School was complemented by weekly support sessions with live virtual Q+A sessions with visiting speakers and also with alumni who shared their experiences of applying to Oxbridge. Applicants also benefitted greatly from a series of mock interviews offered by local contacts and the school is very grateful to them for their support.

Mr Gutch, Deputy headteacher added "Alongside the successes there are of course many very talented students who were disappointed this time but who have very bright futures ahead of them. We are very proud of all the students who applied to Oxbridge this year, indeed we are very proud of all our students who are challenging themselves and working towards achieving their ambitions this year — wherever that may take them."

None of these offers would have been possible without the support provided by all the members of the post-16 team and the support of the subject teachers who invest so much time and energy in supporting the academic and wider development of students and who provide specialist support and advice of the highest quality.

#### Headteacher, Carly Purnell, stated:

"We are incredibly proud of our students who have once again secured offers from Oxford and Cambridge. Earning a place at these world-renowned universities is a testament to their exceptional talent, academic ability, and resilience throughout a highly competitive and intense selection process. This year, offers have been received to read Natural Sciences, Mathematics, Engineering, Law, and Languages—fields that require not only academic excellence but also deep intellectual curiosity and commitment. Every student deserves recognition for their ambition and hard work, and we know they will make the most of the opportunities ahead."



"It is also important to recognise the efforts of all year 13 students, irrespective of the university or course to which they have applied. Beyond Oxbridge, we are also celebrating the many exciting offers our students are receiving from universities and apprenticeship providers across the country which include: Bangor; Birmingham; Bradford; Bristol; Cardiff; Durham; Edinburgh; Exeter; Glasgow; Imperial College, London; Lancaster; Leeds; Liverpool; Loughborough; Manchester; Newcastle; Northumbria; Nottingham; Queen's Belfast; Sheffield; UCL; Warwick; and York, with more offers arriving each day. We are delighted to see their efforts rewarded and wish all our students the very best as they prepare to take their next steps."

On Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> January 55 year 10 students took part in a day of public

speaking workshops with two facilitators from the Speakers Trust. The Speak Out Challenge is a national public speaking competition with 35,000 year 10 students taking part from across the UK. During the workshops students learned techniques for speaking in public – how to structure a speech, how to use eye contact, tone, volume and hand gesture to create variation and emphasis and to get your point across. Many of the students had never given a speech of this kind in public but by the end everyone had prepared and delivered a short speech on a topic of their choice. Topics included electric cars, the Oasis ticket controversy, the march of technology, why we should be able to wear trainers in school as well as a powerful and moving speech by a Ukrainian student about their personal experience of the conflict over the last few years.

Students were able to put themselves forward to take part and, as this is a new skill for many students, others were also nominated by tutors and teachers to participate. A huge well done to all the students involved for overcoming nerves and any uncertainty and for being willing to take part in the day. Throughout the day IGS colleagues who were involved remarked on the warm and supportive atmosphere created by the students.

Ms Claughton and Mr Willet had the privilege of being in the final session of the day and listening to all the speeches. So many of the speeches had memorable moments, some funny and others thought-provoking, but the following students have been specially commended by the Speakers Trust facilitators, Ms Claughton and Mr Willet for their final speeches: Evelyn Kennedy; Sophie Mydlowski; Darius Cizmas; Luke Wright; Honor Jeffries; Sam Hess; Julia Blakemore; Freddie McCutcheon; Ash MacIntosh-Dixon; Sofi Bender; Tholi Gale; Mia Fisher; Mahalia Beevers and Jamie Kemp.

While the emphasis during the day is on the development of public speaking as a skill, a group of students will be selected to deliver their speeches in an assembly with a final school winner and runner up being selected to progress to the regional final.

"I really enjoyed taking part in the Speak Out Challenge because it was a unique experience. What I found challenging was getting out of my comfort zone and talking in front of people in my year I didn't really know. I learnt the importance of body language as well as of using hand gestures. At the start of the day, I wasn't too sure if I was going to push myself to complete it but by the end of the day, I was happy I did. What surprised me was that it wasn't as difficult as I thought it was going to be. I am now much more confident and comfortable talking to large groups of people. In my final speech I spoke on the topic of women's rights and abortion. I am really happy and privileged to have had this opportunity." **Mia F, Year 10** 

"Participating in the Speak Out Challenge and delivering my final speech about my journey to the UK was a transformative experience. At times it pushed me out of my comfort zone, helping me grow in confidence and refine my communication skills in front of a group of people. I also learned to express myself more clearly, control my tone and facial expressions and speak with conviction. I want to thank the Speak Out Challenge team because it taught me important skills that will stay with me for life."
